Dear TC Family,

This year has been a season of rebuilding for Turlock Christian Schools. It has been shaped by challenges inherited from the past and by the quiet, faithful work required to move forward wisely. Rebuilding does not mean we are less of a school; far from it. It means we are strengthening what matters most so that TC stands firm for generations to come.

Rebuilding often happens beneath the surface. Budgets are stabilized. Leadership carries unseen weight. Families remain faithful even when the path forward feels uncertain. In those quiet moments, God is already at work, forming something stronger.

Nehemiah did not ignore reality. He named it plainly: "You see the trouble we are in." Acknowledging hardship is not weakness; it is the first step toward restoration. And then he invited the people into shared purpose:

"Let us rise up and build."

Scripture tells us that the people strengthened their hands for the good work. What a picture of a faithful community, not perfect, not untouched by challenge, yet united, trusting that God is still leading.

Perhaps this season is not about having every answer. Perhaps it is about posture - quiet trust, steady prayer, and hearts aligned with God's direction as He continues to guide TC forward.
